Covering elections in 2020

DEALING WITH COVID-19

This affected both survey interactions with voters and having staff prepared to cover elections remotely

CHANGING SCHEDULE

More elections were rescheduled in 2020 than in the past 32 years combined

WAITING FOR RESULTS

This began with the Iowa
Democratic Caucuses on
February 3rd but became
even more of an issue in the
primary elections after COVID

CHANGING ELECTION RULES

Almost every state made changes to voting methods and reporting election results and courts become involved in procedural rulings



Challenges

Major changes to the voting process



Massive increase in turnout

More than 158 million people voted in 2020, an increase of more than 20 million voters over 2016 and the highest percentage of voting eligible voters since 1900



Large increase in early voting

More than two-thirds of votes in 2020 were cast before election day – approximately 43% by mail and 24% in person at early voting centers – compared to approximately 42% who voted before election day in 2016



Huge partisan differences in the voting method used by voters

Partisan differences led to delays in reporting results in certain states and large swings in the results as they were reported over time




Challenges

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In 2020, Edison Research conducted entrance and exit polls in 23 states of 37,001 Democratic Primary voters





Procedural changes to exit poll interviewing tested in GA, KY, NJ and DE primaries in June and July and used in November

We maintained response rates by using the following interviewing procedures:

Exit Poll Interviewers were required to wear a mask at all times except during breaks

Exit poll materials were placed on a folding table

Gloves, hand sanitizer and sanitizing wipes were made available on the table for voters and the interviewer to use

Interviewers required to wipe down the folding table and use hand sanitizer before touching any exit poll materials


Interviewers approached voters from a 6 foot distance and invited them to participate in the exit

Willing participants
were instructed to take a
survey and single-use
golf pencil from the table,
fill out the survey, and
place it in the ballot box


A garbage bag was provided for voters and interviewers to dispose of gloves, single-use golf pencils and sanitizing wipes



Procedural changes to exit poll interviewing









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Survey methods used in the NEP Exit Poll

In-person exit poll interviews of election day voters at more than 700 polling locations - representing 33% of the vote

In-person exit poll interviews of early voters at more than 175 early voting centers - representing 24% of the vote

Telephone interviews of absentee/by-mail voters – representing 43% of the vote



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




Vote by gender






Vote by age






Vote by race/ethnicity






Vote by education









Do you think [candidate] has the temperament to serve effectively as president?








